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

#### Producer - Max Bullough



Max has spent most of his life being a performer in some form or another. He was smitten with acting and singing when, as a treble in the school choir, he played the part of Joseph in a nativity play. As a student he sang with a choir which competed all over Europe and triumphed at the Eistedfodd at Llangollen and at the International Folk Festival at Cork. When not singing (or fitting in the odd bit of study), Max was involved in costuming productions ranging from studio scale

performances of shows such as "The Soldier's Tale" to the grand productions of the college light-opera society such as "Brigadoon" and "Merry Widow".

When he started teaching in 1978, Max helped with school productions. Over the next sixteen years he worked on the full range from "Oliver" to "Cabaret". At the same time he was taking principal tenor roles himself with a variety of groups. The roles he recalls with most pride have been with Opera Comique and Hillside Opera and as Fairfax and Frederick with WAOS in their productions of "The Yeoman of the Guard" and "Pirates of Penzance" in the early 90's.

Max's association with the Winchester Amateur Operatic Society began in about 1975 as a member of the audience but it was not until November 1990 that he joined them as a singer. It is a relationship he cherishes and he was delighted to produce "The Mikado" two years ago and "Iolanthe" now.

#### Musical Director - Mariane Temperley L.G.S.M



Mariane Temperley studied singing and piano at the Guildhall School of Music and started her career as a professional singer in the BBC Singers. During the course of a varied career, she has appeared in many operatic roles, but the greatest part of her work has been in concerts. These ranged from oratorio, through Gala opera and operetta evenings to musicals and Victorian parlour concerts. She is also on many recordings, notably Lambert's 'Rio Grande' conducted by André Previn.

She now teaches singing privately. She was musical director of Hemel Hempstead Operatic Society for four years, and started a ladies choir in that area called the Decibelles. She has directed the music for three shows for Eastleigh Operatic Society and is enjoying her association with the Winchester Amateur Operatic Society.

#### **Synopsis**

A Victorian girl wanders into a library and comes upon Mr. Gilbert's fairy-tale of "Iolanthe". As she settles down to look at its pictures and read its words she moves into a heady, daydream world filled with the glorious tunes of Sir Arthur Sullivan. She encounters a wonderful mixture of Fairies, Dukes and Earls, the Old Queen, a Little Boy Blue, a Little Bo-Peep, Tweedledum and Tweedledee, a strange dusty old Chancellor and a toy soldier.


Come with us into her children's nursery book land and discover the story that our little girl discovers. First of all, in an Arcadian landscape we meet the fairies who have been living together in each other's company for perhaps a little too long. There are those who would say that their separate eccentricities have become so developed that they look more and more like St. Trinians! Three leading fairies, Celia, Fleta and Leila beg the Queen to release Iolanthe (who was banished for marrying a mortal) and return their best loved companion to them; this Her Majesty allows and we see the favourite restored to her former position.

Then we are introduced to Strephon, Iolanthe's little boy who is only half fairy. We discover that he is in love with Phyllis, who is a ward of court and destined to marry a member of the House of Lords. The Queen has a cunning plan to have Strephon enter Parliament.

At the grand entrance of the Peers we discover that they all seem to be in love with Phyllis and in fact the Lord Chancellor himself is rather keen on her. In an unfortunate moment, Phyllis overhears Strephon talking rather intimately and affectionately to a rather young looking woman. She does not realise that the young thing is his mother and that it is her immortal fairy blood that makes her age so slowly. The Lords are similarly outraged. This of course puts Periland (Fairyland) and "Peeriland" at war with one another. Act One closes with a splendid battle between the forces of the supernatural ladies and those of the prosaic gentlemen. The Queen announces that Strephon has won a landslide victory into the Commons which will result in devastating reform of the Upper House. At the last moment, Phyllis begs Strephon to turn from this course of action but he spurns her!

The second Act is set in the Palace Yard where Private Willis shares his political thoughts with us. Earl Mountararat sings to us how glorious things were in days gone by while the chorus display tableaux of "our naval tradition", "war" and "Britannia". We begin to notice that the fairies are becoming fonder of the Peers than perhaps they should and are put in their place by the Queen relating to them her feelings for the great hero Captain Shaw, the celebrated chief of the London Fire Brigade. Two rival Earls give up their claim on Phyllis's affections and encourage the Lord Chancellor (who has been suffering terrible nightmares) to take her as his own. Only Iolanthe seems able to prevent disaster; to do so she must reveal herself to her husband, the Lord Chancellor himself, and in doing so break her promise to her Queen and thus lay down her own life. With definite echoes of Wagner, the Queen arrives to carry out the sentence and is only halted when all the fairies subsequently admit to secret marriages to Lords themselves. Entire destruction seems the only outcome possible. However, the ingenious legal brain of the Lord Chancellor is at hand to save the day.

#### **Producer's Notes**


Peris are members of a race of beautiful beings of Persian mythology, represented as descended from the fallen angels and so excluded from paradise until such time as their penance is accomplished.

One of the interesting things is that this is one of the most tuneful of Sullivan's works and yet he was writing it over the period during which his mother died. It seems he was able to draw inspiration at a time of immense personal tragedy.

On the opening night (November 25th 1882) he stepped into the pit to conduct having heard that day that the bank containing all his wealth had been bankrupted. He took up the baton virtually penniless. Fortunately, the show was a smash hit and ran for fourteen months, restoring his fortune.

It was also on the opening night that the chief of the London Fire Brigade, one Captain Shaw, a great hero of the city, was sitting in the audience. It is to him, of course, that the Queen of the Fairies sings in an attempt to have her ardour dampened by his "cold cascade".
