He discovers that Hase'n, his bas, has been adding to his price the pay increase demanded by the workers and so he forces him to consent to the raise. Pace is restored.

The show is packed with hit tunes like "Hey there", "There Once Was a Man" and "I'm Not at All in Love". Show stoppers such as 'Steam Heat' and 'Hernando's Hideaway' will leave you breathless...


